By 400, several rules were current, each of which stated the spirit and discipline of monastic life in a different way. The Beguines / b e ˈ ɡ iː n z / and the Beghards / b e ˈ ɡ oː r d z / were Christian lay religious orders that were active in Northern Europe, particularly in the Low Countries, in the 13th-16th centuries. Their members lived in semi-monastic communities but did not take formal religious vows. That is, although they promised not to marry "as long as they lived as Beguines," to quote one of the early Rules, they were free to leave at any time.
