Except for the mother, Hoffman notes, it is men alone who are featured in all rabbinic stories about circumcision. Blood symbolizes the opposition between men and women; women are seen as dirty and as lacking control of their (menstrual) blood and thus of themselves, while men are portrayed as clean and as in control of their (circumcision) blood, thereby supposedly justifying their preferential entrustment with passing on religious doctrine.

Covenant of Circumcision. After Abram had sojourned in the land of promise twenty-four years, the Lord made a covenant with him and changed his name to Abraham (Genesis 12:4 Genesis 12:5; Genesis 17:1-5). The Lord proposed to make of him a great nation and to perpetuate the covenant through his offspring (Genesis 17:6 Genesis 17:7).

Covenant of Circumcision Definition and Meaning - Bible ...

It is a commandment to honor a contract – a covenant – between God and a Jewish male. It is also a physical sign – on a penis! – that such a contract has been made. Further, the actual shedding of blood during the circumcision is what is considered the seal of the contract, making the covenant “sealed in blood.”

The Covenant of Circumcision - Jewish Circumcisions

In circumcision, the blood symbolizes the beginning of a Jewish

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life. In Orthodox and Conservative Judaism, male converts who have already been circumcised are required to participate in a Bris where a drop of blood is pricked from their penis, symbolizing their acceptance of the covenant. In Judaism, blood is often seen as polluting.

Genesis 17 niv - The Covenant of Circumcision - When ...

Circumcision was a process that was done on the most sensitive place of a male, and was a 'cutting away' of the flesh. It was a sign of the old covenant and was to bring humility, obedience and reverence to YHWH. Males could not be in the old covenant without being physically circumcised.

"This is My covenant which you shall keep, between Me and you and thy descendants after thee, every male among you shall be circumcised. And ye shall be circumcised on the flesh of your foreskin, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between Me and you.

Circumcision coincides with the end of a boy's impurity caused by the mother's blood at birth. The entrance of a male into the covenant thus occurs with his transition from female blood to male blood. The contrast between circumcision and the blood of birthing not only reflects differences between genders but it interprets them.

Blood and Men -- Jewish Ritual

In the Abrahamic Blood Covenant, God made the covenant only with Abraham, no one else. Others entered into the Covenant

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between God and Abraham through the rite of circumcision. In Genesis 17:7-14, God outlines how others will enter into the Blood Covenant cut between Him and His friend, Abraham.

Abraham's Side of the Covenant: Circumcision (17:9-14) ... The blood of the Passover lamb on the doorposts is a sign of redemption of the family within the house (Exodus 12:13).[13] Sarah, the Mother of Nations (17:15-16) The covenant considered (a) God's obligations (17:4-8) and (b) Abraham's obligations (17:9-14). 6. The Covenant of Circumcision with Abraham (Genesis 17)

Circumcision is likewise the [symbol of the] covenant which Abraham made in connexion with the belief in God's Unity. So also every one that is circumcised enters the covenant of Abraham to believe in the unity of God, in accordance with the words of the Law, "To be a God unto thee, and to thy seed after thee" (Gen. xvii. 7).

In the rabbinic system, Hoffman argues, circumcision was neither a birth ritual nor the beginning of the human life cycle, but a rite of covenantal initiation into a male "life line." Although the evolution of the rite was shaped by rabbinic debates with early Christianity, the Rabbis shared with the church a view of blood as providing salvation.

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
