Depth of Knowledge (DOK) was developed through research by Norman L. Webb in the late 1990's. It is defined as the complexity or depth of understanding that is required to answer an assessment question. Depth of Knowledge Levels Each level of complexity measures a student's depth of knowledge.

Depth of Knowledge (DOK) Levels

The first Depth of Knowledge level is defined as recollection and reproduction. Rooted in simple exercises and procedures, students must remember facts, terms and formulas. There is little to no need for extended processing, as there aren't opportunities to "solve" anything. A student will or will not know the answer.

One useful tool, Norman Webb's Depth of Knowledge Levels, can help teachers meet that challenge. Depth of Knowledge (DoK) categorizes tasks according to the complexity of thinking required to successfully complete them. Level 1. Recall and Reproduction: Tasks at this level require recall of facts or rote application of simple procedures. The task does not require any cognitive effort beyond remembering the right response or formula.

Depth of Knowledge, or DOK, is a way to think about content complexity, not content difficulty. That is the first thing with which people must come to understanding. Complexity is different from difficulty. For example, if students have not seen the word or content before, it might be difficult for them, but it is not complex.

Professional Development / Depth of Knowledge (DOK)

Level 1 is the first depth of knowledge. It includes recall of facts, concepts, information, and procedures—this is the rote memorization and basic knowledge acquisition that makes higher-level tasks possible. Level 1 knowledge is an essential component of learning that does not require students to go beyond stating information.

The problem above requires much more brain power to solve than figuring out, say, whether 2/5 has a greater value than 3/7. Acknowledging and measuring the differences in cognitive complexity is the basis for Depth of Knowledge (DOK), a term coined by Norman Webb in 1997.
