Corpus Hermeticum: first Latin edition, by Marsilio Ficino, 1471 AD, an edition which belonged formerly to the Bibliotheca Philosophica Hermetica, Amsterdam. The Hermetica are Egyptian - Greek wisdom texts , the bulk of which date to between the 1st century BCE and the 4th century CE, [1] [2] though the oldest parts may go back to the 5th or 6th century BCE.

The treatises presently known as the Corpus Hermeticum, which appear to have diverse authorship and to represent differing and even incompatible philosophical viewpoints, seem to have been brought together as a single body of writings by the time of the great Byzantine scholar Psellus in the eleventh century.
