Abraham Harold Maslow (/ ˈmæsləʊ /; April 1, 1908 – June 8, 1970) was an American psychologist who was best known for creating Maslow's hierarchy of needs, a theory of psychological health predicated on fulfilling innate human needs in priority, culminating in self-actualization.

Maslow subjectively labels his contribution as a "general-dynamic theory" (Malsow, 2013, p. 6). Conceptualizing the project, Maslow offers a framework, which later appears as a hierarchical triangle, only for the purpose of research and questions that the paper may raise in the future.

A Theory of Human Motivation by Abraham H. Maslow

Abraham H. Maslow, an eminent american psychologist, developed a general theory of motivation, known as the 'Need hierarchy theory'. He defined a person's effectiveness as a function of matching man's opportunity with the appropriate position of hierarchy of needs. Process of motivation begins with an assumption that behaviour, atleast in part, is directed towards the achievement of satisfaction of needs.

Maslow's Theory of Motivation - commercemates

Abraham Maslow is considered to be the Father of Humanistic Psychology. His theory is premised on the philosophies of humanism and existentialism that proposed that it is the unique experience of the individual that is the most important phenomenon in the study and analysis of human behavior.

Abraham Maslow is considered as a pyramid with the more basic needs at the bottom. Maslow's hierarchy of needs is a theory in psychology proposed by Abraham Maslow in his 1943 paper "A Theory of Human Motivation" in Psychological Review. There is little scientific basis to the theory: Maslow himself noted this criticism.
