User Settings: U1 and U2 Modes

M (Manual) Explanation: You choose both an aperture and an exposure time with the two command dials. The D7000 will only give you an indicator in the view finder if the resulting exposure is brighter or darker than the one measured by the camera.

Setting Up and Shooting in Manual Mode Turn your camera on and then turn the Mode dial to align the M with the indicator line. Select your ISO by pressing and holding the ISO button on the back left of the camera while rotating the main Command dial with your thumb. The ISO will appear on the top display.

When you've your camera set to Manual (M) mode, your camera meter gives you a reading of the scene you are photographing. It's your task, though, to set both the f-stop (aperture) and the shutter speed to achieve a correct exposure.

The top buttons are great for quickly changing important settings like Camera Mode, Metering and White Balance. Nikon has moved the "MODE" button from the right side of the top of the camera to this area, so you now have to use two hands in order to change the camera mode (keep in mind that unlike other cameras that typically feature a traditional "PASM" dial, the Nikon D500 does not have such dial and requires using this MODE button instead).

When learning how to shoot in manual mode you need to know and understand the "exposure triangle". This is made up of your aperture, shutter speed, and ISO. You use these three components to get your light meter to be at zero. To find your light meter look through your view finder.

What Every Photographer Should Know About Manual Mode

M (Manual Mode) This is the truest "manual mode" setting on any DSLR camera. In this camera mode, you have full control of all the settings including aperture, shutter speed, ISO, and white balance. You use the meter on the camera to determine the exposure and change the aforementioned settings accordingly.

In manual mode, you control both shutter speed and aperture. Shutter speeds of "Bulb" and "Time" are available for long time-exposures of moving lights, the stars, night scenery, or fireworks (0Long Time-Exposures (M Mode Only)). Rotate the mode dial to M.

Shutter Speed and Aperture

Change your camera setting to manual (M) mode and turn it on. Press and hold down the exposure compensation button while turning the rotating dial until the aperture is the lowest f number it can go. You will be able to see this on the back LCD display.

☐ Mode M (Manual) The photographer chooses both aperture and shutter speed, providing the greatest latitude for creative expression. Choosing the wrong combination could, however, result in photographs that are too bright (overexposed) or too dark (underexposed).

Manual exposure mode (M) In manual mode, you take the exposure reins completely, selecting both aperture and shutter speed as follows: To set the shutter speed: Rotate the Command dial. To set the aperture: Press the Exposure Compensation button while rotating the Command dial. Even in this mode, the camera offers an assist by displaying an exposure meter to help you dial in the right settings.
