MAIN OUTCOME MEASURE Stage II, III, or IV pressure ulcer, first mentioned in the long-term-care facility's chart within 2 days of admission. MAIN RESULTS Of the 2015 residents studied, 208 (10.3%) had 1 or more pressure ulcers on admission to a long-term-care facility. The proportion of patients with 1 or more pressure ulcers was 11.9% among those admitted from a hospital and 4.7% among those not admitted from a hospital ($P<.001$).

Preventing Pressure Ulcers in Long-Term Care Facilities

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Place rolled sheet or towel under ankles (not heels) to reduce the pressure of heels against bedding. Provide cushions and padding on assistive devices such as wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, etc. Redistribute weight to remove pressure and prevent tissue injury. Provide for comfort.

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Cross-Setting Pressure Ulcer Measurement & Quality ...

Protect the skin over bony areas. Use pillows or foam wedges to keep bony areas from touching, and to relieve pressure. For example, put a pillow or foam wedge between your knees to keep them from pressing on one another. Place a pillow or foam wedge under you to keep your hip raised when you lie on your side.

How to Prevent Pressure Injuries - What You Need to Know

Pressure ulcer (Pr U) incidence is associated with an increased Morbidity & Mortality – nearly 70% die within six months. (Brown 2003) Pr U incidence is increasing in long term care. (LTC) (Horn et al. 2004)

Wound and Pressure Ulcer Management

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Long-term, nonhealing wounds (Marjolin's ulcers) can develop into a type of squamous cell carcinoma. Sepsis. Rarely, a skin ulcer leads to sepsis. Prevention. You can help prevent bedsores by frequently repositioning yourself to avoid stress on the skin.

Six Steps to Preventing Pressure Ulcers/Injuries

Long-Term Care Home Residents with Pressure Ulcers. This indicator shows the percentage of long-term care home residents in Ontario who had a new pressure ulcer (bed sore), or one that worsened, since their previous assessment by a health care professional. A lower percentage is better. The provincial benchmark is 1%.
