Often translated as the “Book of Formation,” Sefer Yetzirah is the earliest extant Jewish esoteric work and the only one mentioned in the Talmud. According to tradition, it was authored by none other than Abraham (the only person whose name appears in the work).

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The Sefer Yetzirah, which means "Book of Formation," is a short book about the theories of ma'aseh bereshit, the mystical account of the creation of the universe. This book is a complete work of fiction. Another book by this same name, called by many “Pseudo-Jasher,” while written in Hebrew, is also not the “Book of Jasher” mentioned in Scripture. It is a book of Jewish legends from the creation to the conquest of Canaan under Joshua, but scholars hold that it did not exist before A.D. 1625.

The earliest date for the book would be shortly after the events narrated, i.e., c. 460 b.c. (before Ezra's return to Jerusalem; see note on 8:12).
